## A NOTE FROM FR. JIM.....

Monsignor Charles Pope recently gave a beautiful insight into a recent Gospel we had about three weeks ago where the woman touches the hem of Jesus' garment. The question from Jesus was 'Who touched my clothes?' His disciples said to him, "You see how the crowd is pressing round you and yet you say, "Who touched me?" Monsignor Pope stressed that Jesus specifically said 'touched' not bumped up against!! And there's a massive difference. Jesus knew the faith, the humility, the desire for healing, Jesus knew the intentionality of this woman who knew exactly who He was, not like the crowd almost accidentally bumping up against Jesus. They didn't fall down on their knees in faith and humility before him. So the question is when you come forward to receive Jesus in the Eucharist do you approach Jesus like the woman and 'touch' Him or do you receive communion like the crowd who in a careless and thoughtless way just bump up against Him. I bring all this up because during the week about 10 people asked my opinion on the recent controversy of a politician being refused holy communion but I think there's a bigger elephant in the room. And that is: have we as Catholics lost our understanding of what the Eucharist really is? How many of us have the humility to fall on our knees and acknowledge our unworthiness to receive the Creator and Redeemer of the universe God Himself. Instead we puff ourselves up to think we have a right to receive Holy Communion. The truth is none of us are worthy to receive God, even the saints themselves always acknowledged that. But by God's grace and mercy He has given us Himself that we'll receive Him with love and faith and know that by receiving The Body of Christ in Holy Communion is a public aligning of oneself to all His Church's teachings. So living and professing contrary beliefs is sacrilegious, scandalous and a very grave sin. The question I was asked would I publicly refuse a person communion? The answer is no. I would preach the seriousness of not receiving Jesus in a state of grace but I would never act as their conscience. Everyone must ask themselves do we touch Jesus with faith and love or do we approach Him with indifference and bump up against Him?
