Letter of Pope Francis on the role of literature in formation. The habit of reading a novel or poetry has numerous positive effects on people's lives. It stimulates their imagination and creativity, enabling them to learn to tell their stories in richer and more expressive ways. It also improves their ability to concentrate, reduces levels of cognitive decline, and calms stress and anxiety. Even more, reading prepares us to understand and thus deal with various situations that arise in life - we immerse ourselves in the thoughts, concerns, tragedies, dangers and fears of characters who in the end overcome life's challenges. Perhaps too, in following a story to the end, we gain insights that will later prove helpful in our own lives. A novel, poem or play helps us to reflect on the meaning of our presence in this world, to "digest" and assimilate it, and to grasp what lies beneath the surface of our experience. Literature, in a word, serves to interpret life, to discern its deeper meaning and its essential tensions. It broadens our humanity. We think of the words left

us by the poet Paul Celan: "Those who truly learn to see, draw close to what is unseen".

Eternal God, in whom mercy is endless and the treasury of compassion inexhaustible, look kindly upon us and increase your mercy in us, that in difficult moments we might not despair nor become despondent, but with areat confidence submit ourselves to your holy will, which is Love and Mercy itself.
